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Annual Conference to use electronic voting system for delegates

Secure, easy, efficient.

Those are some of the words used to describe the electronic voting system that will be unveiled at the West Virginia Annual Conference June 13-16 in Buckhannon.

Annual Conference lay members and clergy will use the system to elect six delegates — three lay people, three clergy — to the May 2020 General Conference in Minneapolis, MN; and also to elect delegates to the July 2020 Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference in Hunt Valley, MD.

Rev. Mark Conner is retiring as Worship Planning Team leader

When all of the hymns have been sung during Sunday's worship service at Annual Conference and the benediction has been given, it will mark the end of Rev. Mark Conner's time as the leader of the Worship Planning Team.

Mark began working with the team in 1984, participating in various roles and positions. Mark said of his time as team leader, "It has been amazing to watch the process. It is a beautiful, spirit-filled process." Mark also enjoys the collegial work he gets to engage in with the entirety of the team.

Rev. Krysta Rexrode Wolfe said, "Mark is a gifted pastor whose humor, diligence, and institutional memory have made the programming and worship planning for Annual Conference a joy...his retirement, while much earned, is a sad occasion for those of us who have had the honor to walk alongside him in his work."

The worship theme of this year's Annual Conference is "Invitational." Krysta, who will be the leader of the Worship Planning Team for the upcoming year, said, "The theme allows Christ's followers to be both guests at Christ's table and hosts to the hope and life of the gospel."

Every year the Annual Conference theme changes but the focus is always a reflection of the Annual Conference's

transformation of the world."

Alongside their citations this year, the Worship Planning Team included margin notes in the Conference Workbook which explain the "why and what of the worship services we planned," said Krysta. The hope of both Mark and Krysta is that local churches will be able to use the workbook citations and notes to implement elements and practices from worship at Annual Conference in their local churches.

You are invited...

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to be nourished, and to gain strength and assurance for the Christian journey.

At this annual conference session, we are accepting Christ's invitation to gather around the table, Christ's table - to share the good news, to be nourished, and to receive strength and assurance for our journey together as the West Virginia Conference.

"Christ our Lord invites to his table all who love him, who earnestly repent of their sin and seek to live in peace with one another."

Jesus invites us, calls us to come and see, to stay and remain with him in order that we may know, believe, follow, and live our lives as Jesus does.

Christ's table is an invitation to be one family – one body of Christ. At the table God's spirit moves to make us "one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world." This is an invitation to understand ourselves as

sons and daughters of Christ, children of God, an invitation to become each other's brothers and sisters in the best sense.

At the table we remember that Christ calls us to be present with each other when the going gets hard. At the table Jesus invites us to believe in each other and try to bring out the best in each other. Christ's table invites us to share each other's burdens, griefs, and joys.

So, you are invited! Christ invites us. Come and gather with us around the Christ's table for annual conference knowing you are welcome and welcomed. Come expecting to experience the presence of our host, Jesus Christ. Come to the table seeking to connect to the source of hope and life, seeking to draw our love from God, so that we, together, may be empowered to help each other love both God and neighbor, become a Christ-led spiritual breath of fresh air in anxious times, and more effectively make disciples who make more disciples and transform the world.

Electronic Voting

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Voting typically takes a considerable amount of time at Annual Conference. "People ask me at the end of every conference, 'Why can't we vote electronically?" said Conference Secretary Judith Kenaston. "We will use it this year to elect delegates. Other votes will be conducted in traditional ways."

Kenaston said great care has been taken to ensure the security of the electronic voting system. For example, the system uses its own wireless network, not the internet. Also, lay and clergy members will be issued different devices, making it impossible for lay people to vote in the election of clergy delegates and vice versa.

"We have to make sure we have a valid and secure vote," Kenaston said. "That's my job."

Electing delegates to the May 2020 General Conference and the July 2020 Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference will be among the most important decisions made at Buckhannon.

General Conferences, usually held every four years, are where changes are made to the Book of Discipline and the Book of Resolutions.

The Book of Discipline outlines the law, doctrine, administration, organizational work and procedures of The United Methodist Church.

The Book of Resolutions contains the text of all resolutions or pronouncements on issues approved by the General Conference that are currently valid.

Lay delegates to the 2020 General Conference will be elected by the lay members in Buckhannon who cast ballots. Twenty lay people were nominated at last year's Annual Conference. Information about the nominees is published on pages 201-211 of the Conference Workbook.

Additional candidates may be nominated from the floor prior to voting.

All of the candidates will be assigned a number. The election will begin at Friday's 8:45 a.m. business session.

At the start of the session, all eligible lay members (who will have blue name tags) within the bar (the official areas designated for members) will be asked to stand as able. Tellers will give each one an electronic voting device.

Kenaston said the device will be easy to use. It looks like a television remote control. Each member will be given a sheet with printed instructions and there will be verbal instructions and tests before any votes are taken.

A candidate must receive more than 50 percent of the

votes cast to be elected.

During the first round of voting, lay members will be instructed to vote for three candidates. They will do so by pressing the numbers assigned to the candidates of their choice.

"The device will tell you to vote for three people," Kenaston said. "You will enter a number and hit, 'Send.' The device will then read, 'Sending...' and then, 'REMAIN: 2'. Then you will type in a number and hit 'Send.' The device will read, 'Sending...', followed by 'REMAIN: 1'. Finally, you'll enter a third number and hit 'Send'. The device will read, 'Sending...' followed by 'BALLOT CLOSED."

The Conference Secretary will read the names of all candidates who receive 10 or more votes. Then those names and numbers will be displayed on screens throughout the sanctuary.

"We hope this is more efficient than paper balloting," Kenaston said.

If a second ballot is necessary, the names and numbers of all candidates who receive 15 or more votes after the second round will be read and then displayed.

If three or more ballots are necessary, the names and numbers of all candidates who receive 20 or more votes will be read and then displayed each time.

The balloting will continue until three candidates are elected.

"During the balloting, if one person is elected, then you would only be voting for two people on the next ballot," Kenaston said. "You will be required to vote for the correct number of candidates. If the balloting is for two people and you only vote for one person, your ballot will be invalid."

Some ballots were invalid in past elections because a vote was cast for someone who had already been elected, or a member voted for too many people. "The electronic voting system will not allow you do to that, so it will cut down on invalid ballots," Kenaston said.

Voting devices will be collected at the end of each business session.

Qualified clergy (who will have green name tags) will vote for three clergy delegates to the General Conference. Clergy will vote separately but use similar procedures.

The clergy nomination process and information about some of the clergy candidates is published on pages 213-226 of the Conference Workbook. A list of all clergy eligible to be elected will be distributed at Conference.

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West Virginia Conference Health Insurance Recommendations for 2020

Where are we now?

Throughout the last year we heard your strong desire to maintain the current level of benefits and to limit cost increases to clergy and their families. The Conference Board of Pensions has proceeded with these priorities in mind.

Why do we have to make changes?

For the past two years, health insurance expenses have exceeded income. It has been necessary to draw money from reserves in order to cover a deficit of approximately \$3,000,000 last year.

What actions did the Conference take?

The Board of Pensions has researched options for health insurance coverage.

Proposals were received from HealthFlex (managed by WesPath), BlueCross/BlueShield, The Health Plan, Aetna and Cigna, and compared all to our current partially self-funded plan (administered by Benefit Assistance Corporation).

After comparing all proposals submitted, the Board determined there would be no cost benefit and less flexibility in making a change from our current plan.

Are there changes to who is eligible?

No, those who are eligible for coverage will remain the same as last year.



Who do these recommendations affect?

All congregations participate through the apportionment process, as well as those congregations which pay a percentage of their pastor's health insurance premium.

Can we expect similar increases in the future?

There is no way for us to accurately predict the future,

but based on past trends...most likely, yes. Due to the rising costs of healthcare today, we are facing a likelihood of increased costs. Our commitment is to manage these expenses as carefully and creatively as possible.

We have made overall adjustments to the conference budget to limit an apportionment increase. The entire conference budget will increase 3.55% or \$441,193 in 2020, with \$425,000 of that in Medical Insurance.

How can participants take steps to control their costs and manage their health?

They can engage their physician and pharmacist in conversation about possible cost-saving options with regard to their health care and medications. We want to help. The conference website (www.wvumc.org/health-care/) has many resources for information on prescription discounts, the Virgin Pulse health benefit program, and more.

Electronic Voting

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"Some people have said that voting takes too long," Kenaston said. "People get tired of the process. But it's important we follow the process." Even though electronic voting may be more efficient, ample time for discernment will be provided between votes, she said.

Kenaston, who has served as a delegate in the past, said, "Being a delegate to General Conference can be rewarding but it is also a challenge physically, mentally, emotionally, and sometimes spiritually. There is considerable reading, study, and preparation required prior to the two-week session, in addition to the demands of the conference itself."

Similar voting procedures will be followed to elect delegates to the July 2020 Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference.

The Northeastern Jurisdiction consists of 10 annual conferences and 9 Episcopal Areas that stretch from West Virginia to Maine. The primary purpose of a jurisdictional conference is to elect bishops.

"We will not know the number of bishops to be elected until after decisions are made at the General Conference," Kenaston said. "The General Conference will determine the allotment of bishops in the jurisdictions."

Clergy to meet Thursday at Chapel Hill UMC while laity gather at Center for the Performing Arts

The work of the 2019 Annual Conference begins Thursday with clergy and laity sessions.

At 10 a.m. all clergy (licensed, deacons and elders) who are currently under appointment, retired, or in extension ministry, are invited to attend the Clergy Session at Chapel Hill United Methodist Church, 88 South Kanawha St., Buckhannon.

All others are invited to attend the laity session at the Virginia Thomas Law Center for the Performing Arts at 10am.

The performing arts center is a new location for the laity session. It is behind Wesley Chapel, on the opposite side of College Avenue from the main campus. Handicap parking is available and there is a circle in front of the building for dropping off passengers. In addition, golf carts will be available for transportation needs.

The laity session will include information about the voting processes and things that laity will need to know about other Annual Conference activities. Ken Willard, the conference director of discipleship, leadership and congregational vitality, will remind us of our mission and the importance

of spirit-filled, called lay leadership in the conference and in the world. Rich Shaffer will share highlights from the meeting of national Annual Conference Lay Leaders that he recently attended.

It is important that each person have the Conference Workbook and the information that is distributed at registration when attending the business sessions. These documents will be referred to by page number or document number throughout the sessions.

Also, during business sessions, it is important that all those with a vote sit within the "bar" of the conference. The bar includes most of the floor seating in Wesley Chapel (excluding the two back rows, which are for guests who are unable to go upstairs to sit on the sides of the balcony) and most of the center balcony section. There will be instructions at the first business session.

During worship and at other special times, seating is permitted anywhere except in specially marked reserved
