Greetings from the Annual Conference worship team. We are glad to be with you at West Virginia Wesleyan College. Our team is privileged to create meaningful worship services for the people of the West Virginia Annual Conference. Our hope is that we are able to facilitate worship which can refresh ministry and mission in our Conference area.

Worship is a powerful declaration that God is in the midst of all that is happening in our world today. Worship is a profound point of connection which reminds the Church that we are a beloved and forgiven community called to proclaim peace and bring good news to a weary world. In an effort to help you see how we designed worship, and, in the hopes you will be able to use elements of our worship in your local church, we have included margin notes. The margin notes provide hymn histories, liturgical rubrics, theological reflections, and important citations. We give thanks for all those who worked diligently to bring this resource to you, and pray that it will be a blessing for you and your community in the future.

Processional Hymn:

Processional Hymns are at the beginning of a service, when a group of those participating, such as clergy or the choir, walk in during the hymn, often following behind a processional cross carried by a "crucifer." "Lift High the Cross" is often sung as an Easter hymn, especially as its lyrics bring to mind Christ's triumph over death in his resurrection.

Call to Worship:

The call to worship, often the first invitation for those gathered to join their voices together, is designed to help introduce the focus of the time together and usher us into an attitude of worship.



Holy Communion

Invitation to the Table:

Holy Communion is one of two sacraments in The United Methodist Church. It is an act believed to be ordained by Christ which brings us into the grace of God. We are not made more worthy of grace by receiving Communion, we are simply made more ready to receive it, strengthened to proclaim with our words and deed the good news in our communities. In The United Methodist Church we celebrate an open invitation to take Communion, meaning you do not have to be a member of the church or baptized, persons of any age may receive Communion, and with any background. All that is required of a person wishing to join the holy feast is that they love God, neighbor, and self and seek to live in peace and reconciliation.

Invitation to the Table

We are drawn to the table because we are happy and unhappy, because we are pilgrims and hosts, because we are trying to leave or return home.

And at the table we are given the good news that God's love rushes forth, not only for the few and certain, but for the many who seek.

The invitation is extended by Christ himself, the Savior whose reputation was ruined by those with whom he dined.

Today, all who are gathered are called as guests to the table, and all who accept the invitation accept a journey of transformation.

Come, all who desire a taste of God's abundance, God's compassion and God's higher way; and come, having confessed our sins before God and one another.





Bishop Steiner Ball, I am pleased to present to you these persons who will be commissioned or ordained as servant leaders for the work and ministry of the Church.

Asking of the Historic Questions

(Candidates respond in bold)

The examination of candidates for membership is an historic action of the Annual Conference. In accordance with the usage and Discipline of The United Methodist Church and the traditions of our community, and in the presence of this Conference, I ask you:

Have you faith in Christ? I have. Are you going on to perfection? I am, by the grace of God. Do you expect to be made perfect in love in this life? God willing, I do. Are you earnestly striving after perfection in love? With God's help, I am. Are you resolved to devote yourself wholly to God and God's work? I am so resolved. Do you know the General Rules of our Church? I do. Will you keep the General Rules of our Church? I will so endeavor. Have you studied the doctrines of The United Methodist Church? I have studied them. After full examination, do you believe that our doctrines are in harmony with the Holy Scriptures? I believe that they are. Will you preach and maintain them? To the best of my ability, I will. Have you studied our form of Church discipline and polity?

I have.

Introduction to the Historic Questions:

United Methodist pastors since 1773 have answered nineteen historic questions as a way of agreeing to how they will live into this ministry life. Before answering these questions in the presence of the Annual Conference candidates have reflected and written answers to the Board of Ordained Ministry. In addition, each has heard a meditation and explanation of the questions from our Bishop. As a church, we are grateful for the time and careful reflection of all who answer these questions as they prepare for vocational ministry.

Do you approve our Church government and polity? I do so approve.

Will you support and maintain them?

I will, with God's help.

Will you diligently instruct the children in every place?

I will.

Will you visit from house to house?

This is my commitment.

Will you recommend fasting and abstinence, both by precept and example?

I will so recommend.

Are you determined to employ all your time in the work of God?

This is my intention.

Are you in debt so as to embarrass you in your work?

I am not.

Will you observe the following directions? Be diligent. Never be unemployed. Never be triflingly employed. Never trifle away time: neither spend any more time at any one place than is strictly necessary. Be punctual. Do everything exactly at the time. And do not mend our rules, but keep them; not for wrath, but for conscience sake.

The Lord being my helper, I will.

As your hands and feet, heart and soul on earth, we rejoice in the variety of ways you have called us. 



Retirees: Bless them with strength and wisdom for their work, so that they may lead consistently and faithfully.


Leader: Soon to be commissioned and ordained: Bless us with rest and play so that we might always be connected to the liberation and mercy of the Gospel.


For All the Saints, UMH 711 v. 1, 2, 4 & 6

Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile

he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.
